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SENATOR JENSEN: ...as to where that will be.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Bourne and Senator Jensen.  
Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'm going back to the amendment that we're on, but I think the overall discussion is good. No, let me...let me talk about what I said I was going to talk about. Before Senator Jensen's amendment was offered, the person to be grandfathered would only have to have so many hours of experience. I realize that if rules and regulations are to be implemented, a public hearing precedes that. But let me show you what a skeptical person, such as I have become as a result of my years of experience in the Legislature and watching how things work, let me tell you what I'm seeing as a possibility in the amendment that we're being asked to adopt at this point. If Senator Bourne is a tattooist...oh, a body artist, he's a body artist and I'm a mere tattooist, Senator Bourne can be called a body artist because he took some formal training someplace. I'm a mere tattooist because I watched, I paid attention, and then I started doing it. So when time comes for us to be grandfathered in, in the natural sense I am a literal grandfather; Senator Bourne is not. But Senator Bourne might argue that he should be grandfathered into this bill, but not me, and here's why. He would argue that when you look at this multitude of rules and regulations that can be called that, that are in the statute, and the discussion from the Legislature as found in the transcript, safety, public health are guiding or predominating principles. If we are going to allow people to be licensed without going through all of these steps that a newly...a person who wants to get into this activity for the first time would have to go through, we should make sure that those people being grandfathered in have met standards. So the documentation should require that this person show some training. Well, now, I'm getting more business than Senator Bourne because I learned by doing. I don't push my needles as far under the skin as Senator Bourne, I don't need as much ink as Senator Bourne, and I just happen to be a better artist than Senator Bourne. So he can get the state to eliminate me as competition by saying, require this training. If that word "training" were not in the statute, he would have
