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to make his case, and I could argue against it in the way that I'm doing here. But if you put the word "training" in the statute, Senator Bourne doesn't have to argue. It's there. I cannot prove that I have training. I have many more years of experience than Senator Bourne. I put the first tattoo on Popeye, but I can't be grandfathered in. So, as you look at this bill and the direction that it's going, either everybody should have to take the same training, or you eliminate training for those who are to be grandfathered in. I don't think there was any intent to do anything sinister or hurt the bill by crafting the amendment...

SENATOR CUDABACK PRESIDING

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in the way that it appears before us; namely, we strike the 6,000 hours of experience and require just training and experience, the amount and nature of which will be determined by the board. I don't trust the board that much. I don't even know who all is on the board. But since we're going into a new area and we're going to put such detailed material into the statute, I'm going to be very careful in what I agree to put there. And what Senator Jensen can be considering, and I'll mention it in the few seconds I may have, what other activity is regulated in as much detail as what we're doing here? Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Senator Cudaback, members of the Legislature, I thought, when I first looked at this issue, that this was a replay of a related issue we had about four years ago that had to do with nails, and the nail operations that were springing up, small businesses oftentimes in depressed and low-income areas, a lot of times in immigrant communities, a small business that a rather large number of first generation immigrant families were able to get into as a small business. And in came a bill that had a very high standard of training, of knowledge and everything else. That bill served essentially to embrace longstanding, larger facilities, and create burdens for people
