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SENATOR JENSEN: I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, this bill was heard by your Health Committee. Is that correct?

SENATOR JENSEN: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What kind of pictures of horrible and botched tattooing were presented to your committee?

SENATOR JENSEN: Not a lot of pictures. We did have testimony from some individuals, some parents, who had talked about the things that had happened. And like the Department of Health or Health and Human Services had had enough calls that they were concerned about this industry--are the proper procedures being taken care of.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: When they were giving these anecdotal examples, were they distinguishing between how the job itself was done and how the person who received the tattoo may have tended to it after receiving it? And an example I will give you right off the top of my head, former heavy-weight champion, Mike Tyson, had a tattoo put on his face and he had a boxing match shortly thereafter, and doctors and others said that should not be done, this is way too soon after that tattoo had been placed. So was there a distinction made between what the tattooist did and what the recipient may not have done that he or she should have done?

SENATOR JENSEN: No, that did not come up, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Can you think of any other activity that has the amount of specific, detailed regulatory language in the statute that is being offered here to deal with tattooing?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes, like we did...that was Senator Suttle's bill, I believe, on that cosmetology that we had before that looked at that issue and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But we got a lot of that taken out, because...
