just briefly and then I will give my time to Senator Beutler or Senator Janssen, should they choose. But this part of the amendment is very simple. It changes the number of casinos downward from eight to five, and I am hopeful that no matter where you are on this issue that you will think that that is a reasonable step and that you will support the downward motion. I know there are a lot of people on this floor who would prefer one, and actually I would too, but I don't think we're going to get there. What we need to do is find the number that works for 30 people on this floor. And as I said the other day, it is a numbers game. But those of you who have been opposed to the eight, I hope you will support the five, and we can continue talking about the numbers. And with that, Mr. President, I would like to give my time to Senator Janssen, if I could.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Janssen, Senator Schimek has used about eight...about one point five minutes. She had about 8, 34 left.

SENATOR JANSSEN: All right, thank you. Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Thank you, Senator Schimek. I want you all to realize that if we bring this down to five or eight or whatever the number is, you, the members in this Legislature, will be able to determine that number. You could go next year, if this amendment were to pass by the voters, which I have...I have no problem with that. If they turn it down, that's fine. If they vote for it, that's fine too. We'll work with it then. You could have zero. I wouldn't suggest going back to your district right away, but you could go from zero up to five. That's not...it's not set in stone. The Legislature will determine how many in that range there will be. So if you are definitely opposed to letting this happen, you have that opportunity next year to come back and say, well, maybe not all of us will be here. But you can make that decision then. That's why I had always thought, you know, with just a simple amendment to allow this kind of gaming and the Legislature will take care of the numbers, what kind of games, where they're going to be at, or if they are with a vote of the people, without the vote of the people. That's what I envisioned, and you could...you could have set that. That's the way I started out several years ago, was with a very, very simple amendment. And the way things are
