SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature--that's all I'll ask you, Senator--this is not a bill that ought to be before us at this time, under any circumstances. But it is so poorly crafted and so disproportionate that this Legislature should not give serious consideration to passing it. And I intend to do all I can to defeat it. Senator Cunningham talks about saving money for this particular fund. I am interested in the people who are not working, who have no income. Before they qualify for unemployment benefits, they must have done some working. I have a case that I'm going to present, in the way that my colleagues have various cases, where a man and his son were working for a moving company. The man wanted to continue to have his son work on the jobs that he was sent to, so he could look out for his son. His son had been physically assaulted on a job. The son was then assigned to a job, and his father said, I don't want him to go there without me; I want us to work together. The boss of the job was known to carry a pistol, he was known to be abusive, and this man, because he refused to let his son go to work on a job with a person who had assaulted him, this man was terminated. Now, Senator Cunningham would feel that that man should not have insisted on protecting his son. I see this as a problem with the Department of Labor and these so-called administrative judges. I started to call the director, because the man did appeal. Then I decided I would not intervene; I would see how he is going to handle an unjust case such as this. If he approved, the Department of Labor and its boss will be in my cross hairs next session and for the three remaining sessions after that that I'll be here. I am tired of people being unfairly treated, and then bills brought here by senators...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who have no concern about working people, and not even any genuine understanding of the bill that they've presented. I'm tired of people standing on this floor making comments which are ill-advised. And one thing that also makes me tired is somebody who hasn't even been here for three weeks talking about how this is the worst session of the Legislature, complaining about a priority bill not being up, and it's still
