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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Nobody from the National Guard approached you?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: No. No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schimek, where will this person be serving if there is supposed to be an international conflict involved? Will that person be...?

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator, before you go into a long list of questions, I should tell you that I have been out in the lobby and I have talked to John Albin, and he says, basically, they've researched this, they don't think this amendment would affect anybody, so I'm going to pull the amendment. I don't want to have you waste all your energy on this amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: You're welcome.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Members of the Legislature, since I do have a little bit of time left, I want to turn my focus on the bill itself. Senator Louden's amendment would be attached to the bill if it's adopted. I want Senator Louden to know that I am not opposed to old people. My grandparents were old, my parents were old when they left here, I am old, my children are going to be old someday. But that has nothing to do with the position I'm taking here. He has a person--and I'm using that term in quotes--he has a person he wants to place on the back of the jockey riding Senator Cunningham's horse. The horse is no good. The horse is on its way to the glue factory.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Louden may feel that even on a nag headed to the glue factory, where there's life there's hope, so he wants to add some additional weight to that nag. It is not going to change my mind. I don't think his amendment ought to be adopted. You probably will adopt it anyway. But that then brings us right back to the underlying poor quality and injustice of the bill itself. I don't know how many people,
