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it should be confined. And if Senator Cunningham wants to talk about restricting the programs to those people who are fired for truly misconduct, truly egregious reasons, then I would be willing to talk to him about those people. Or in Senator Smith's case, where somebody leaves employment just to sit on the couch, they should not qualify for...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...unemployment insurance. Unfortunately, Senator Cunningham's bill is too broad.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Schimek. You're recognized, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you. Mr. President and members, I do intend to pull my amendment. And before I do, I just wanted to explain that in discussions with the Department of Labor out in the Rotunda, they said that they have researched the impact of the amendment that I had mentioned to you, and they don't believe it will impact anybody, because there are federal provisions that take care of those situations. So unbeknownst to me, I was simply trying to do something that is already taken care of in federal law and regs. So I will pull...ask to pull my amendment, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schimek. FA1457 is withdrawn. We are back to the Louden amendment, AM2291. Continue discussion. Senator Chambers, followed by Senators Beutler, Vrtiska, Combs, Brown, Smith, Bourne, and Louden. Senator Chambers. And this is your third time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: On Senator Louden's amendment? I had spoken on Senator Schimek's.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry. I'm...my fault. My first mistake. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And we will not use the word "fault." That can happen, Senator, because sometimes I ask which time it is of mine, and I should keep track, but I lose it. So that was no
