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SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback and members. Well, it's been an interesting conversation so far. Somebody asked if they should pull the arrows out of my back. I guess I apologize for being such a bad person, but I'm only doing what I think is right and necessary. And I would start by telling you, I do support Senator Louden's amendment. And I said earlier I am carrying this bill for absolutely no one. I've been in the business community for many years and I've seen what happens, and fortunately in my store that hasn't happened. I don't know that I've ever had anyone collect unemployment insurance, so I'm very fortunate there. But I do want to stress that I'm carrying this for no one. And I would ask Senator Chambers a question, if he would answer.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, I would, and I'm not...I'm not an archer while I mention...okay.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Senator Chambers, just the person you mentioned early this morning, the person that was fired, when you...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...the one that worked with his son, now he hasn't...he hasn't gone through the adjudication process yet, has he?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: At that time, he was in a process of filing an appeal of the administrative judge's opinion...

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, I mean, I...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...determination.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...I'm not an expert, by all means, but from everything I've read, that person would not be disqualified, I wouldn't think, from reading the other case law. And if you were to look, I handed a...or I had a paper sent around that gave some examples of case law for you to read, and
