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I think if you...if you read that objectively, you will see that it does pretty much fall down on the side of the employee. So I think we treat the employees pretty well.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are you going to let me respond to that, or you'd rather I not? Because it's your time.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I'm going to ask you one more question.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. And I'll be allowed to respond to it?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: To the question I ask you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) And in my own way. Thank you, Senator Cunningham.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Senator Chambers, the first...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...when I...when I gave the example of the nurse in the nursing home that was misappropriating medications and she was...and she was fired,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Uh-huh.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...how long do you think she should have been disqualified for? What's your opinion what's right?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I didn't hear everything that you said. How long a time was she disqualified for?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: She was disqualified for eight weeks, but yet she was misappropriating medicines in a nursing home.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There may have been extenuating circumstances, for example, being directed to do so, as some pharmacists have done flunkies.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, I don't happen to think that was the case, but...
