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cause.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Where the claimant voluntarily left his job after experiencing racial harassment at work for over...work for over seven years, it was held that he had good cause to terminate his employment and was eligible for benefits without disqualification. So with that, Mr. Speaker, I'll turn the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Cunningham. Senator Hartnett.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, one of my concerns, I think it was raised earlier by Senator Vrtiska, is the money that is in the trust fund, Unemployment Trust Fund. And maybe this is...I think that's where, Senator Cunningham, this will help, you know, but is it the right place, or should business community do more? Because the figures I've just got on this thing that are benefits paid every week is over \$3 million. Business is only contributing in \$4 million, so it's just running a little bit ahead. And in the trust fund is \$98 million, which is one of the lowest figures that we've had. And so maybe this would help it, but does it go on the wrong...I supported the bill in committee, but is this the right way to go, or do we need to have a bigger...I'm concerned about the trust fund and business doesn't seem to want to step up. They are, you know, I think...I think we're...I'm concerned about that and I think we needed...I think that's something we need to address. We have a bill in committee that we need to address dealing with this issue. And so I will continue to listen to the debate on Senator Beutler's bill (sic), and I would give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Chambers, you have 3 minutes and 30 seconds.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Members of the Legislature, despite what Senator Cunningham read in terms of good cause, when an amendment is
