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gives so much away to businesses, and I'll bet Nebraska ranks among the top if not at the very top in terms of what is given away to these businesses based on the population of the state or the actual dollar amounts, giveaways to business near the top; assistance to those no-longer-working people near the bottom. And there's a boastfulness about it. Senator Cunningham said, this is how cold I am; they shouldn't get anything. But he votes for every one of those corporate giveaways, even though they don't benefit his area. I'm more concerned about the farmers in the rural areas than Senator Cunningham and other farmer senators and rural representatives on this floor, and my record demonstrates it. I don't just take the safe position, and in Nebraska, on the floor of this Legislature, the safe position is the position that business wants. Why, the tight-fisted, grasping, grinding, stingy attitude on this floor makes Ebenezer Scrooge seem like a philanthropist. This is the Legislature...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that came to the aid of businesses and said the premiums you pay will be reduced. Whether you all want to acknowledge or not, there are a lot of people who run farms but they have to take off-the-farm jobs. You're not just cutting city people. You're cutting rural people. And I see here neither city nor rural. I see people, and I see people who are being treated unjustly in order that those who fare sumptuously every day may do so off the backs of those workers who make their profits possible. Why, the piddling amounts that Nebraska pays in benefits is enough to cause shame. But to heap on top of that this injustice that Senator Cunningham is bringing to us is unconscionable and immoral. And if I really felt like being honest, I would use language that is not so kind, soft and compassionate in...
