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unemployment. And with that, I would return my time to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Louden. Senator Chambers, on the motion to reconsider, offered by Senator Louden.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I say again, this is a bad bill. But I have certain standards and lines that I will not cross. The introducer of this bill tattled on me. He's a tattle-tale. He told his beloved parents, whom I respect to the highest, that I've been on occasion a naughty fellow, and that I say unkind things. But I assured him that I'm going to clean up my act today, and I will not be harsh, and I will not be mean today. But (singing) "there's got to be a morning after." (Laugh) Anyway, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this still is a bad bill. I can understand what Senator Louden is trying to do, and I applaud him for his tenacity. I've listened to what Senator Combs has said. I listened to Senator Brown. I listened to Senator Bourne. But I'm a little confused by Senator Combs, so I would like to ask her a question, because she may have been talking about something different from what I thought she was. Senator Combs, are you supporting Senator Louden's amendment?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Combs.

SENATOR COMBS: Yes, I am.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Then I did understand what you said. And you are in favor of the bill, obviously, because you've always been in favor of it.

SENATOR COMBS: Right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If his amendment is not adopted, would you still be in favor of the bill?

SENATOR COMBS: You bet.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I don't gamble. But I understand what you mean. (Laughter) Now if it was sporting event, it might be
