more time, Senator Chambers, you can...okay, fine. I'll return the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Jensen. Senator Friend.

SENATOR FRIEND: Thank you, Mr. President. I was wondering if Senator Chambers would yield to a quick question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will yield to several questions from Senator Friend.

SENATOR FRIEND: Okay. Thank you. Thank you, Senator Chambers. Can you...and you might have mentioned this, and I didn't hear your whole opening. Can you tell me--and I know you've probably studied this--what some other states...first of all, since we're unique, what some other states do...have done, or how consistent they would be, if something like this passed, with the state of Nebraska? I mean, what are the presiding officers over legislative bodies in other states? And educate me, from a federal standpoint. Are we...is this consistent with a movement that a lot of other states, and maybe from a federal standpoint, that we're looking at here?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Friend, I don't know what any other state has done. And I didn't look at that. I'm looking strictly at the situation in Nebraska, the fact that we have a Unicameral, and that term limits will come in. But even before all those things, I have never felt that the Lieutenant Governor should preside over the Legislature. So I can't tell you what any other state is doing.

SENATOR FRIEND: Okay. So one more question. That means when you're Lieutenant Governor, you won't be sitting up there at all? (Laughter)

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Friend, when I escape, when I escape the chains of public life that are put on me in the Legislature, you will not see me even talk about being in another public office.
