biologist. There's no requirement for anybody being specifically trained in air quality; no requirements in terms of ability or knowledge or skill other than a physician and an engineer. They simply have to be representatives of industry, of agriculture,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR PREISTER: ...of petroleum, of automobile, of large industry. These requirements say they need to represent the industry, and the industry needs a voice on the Environmental Quality Council. I don't disagree with that completely, but it needs to be a balance. It needs to be composed of people who represent and have qualifications to set good policy, not simply somebody who's a member of an industry. And when it's almost entirely made up of industry representatives or "regulatees," I think that's inappropriate. I don't think it passes the smell test, and that's the larger issue that this confirmation brings to mind. We're not dealing with that in this. I have other legislation. I support what...
