need that understanding, but I think it will be good to have the record clear on what it is we're doing. I have gotten calls from individuals who were victimized--and I use that term on purpose--by acts of medical malpractice. There is one case that was in the news recently. And although a judgment for a considerable amount of money was awarded, the limitation that Nebraska has reduced that amount considerably. So the family is not going to be able to pay the actual medical expenses of their child, which will mean that either the child is to go the way that was recommended by Jonathan Swift in his tract A Modest Proposal, or the state, meaning all of the citizens, are going to have to subsidize the care and treatment of that child. This is what a society should do. All the resources of those who have are pooled to help those who have not. Now, that is the way you would do it in a neutral set of circumstances. But if you have...oh, some people may wonder what Jonathan Swift's tract was about. The British and the Irish have not gotten along too well. They have been disputing and arguing for a considerable number of years. Some people believe that the British and the Irish come from a common ancestry. Not going all the way back to Africa, where the first human being came from, but more recently than that. And some of the bitterest quarrels are those that occur between brothers or family members. Once they fall out, and all of the ties of blood, consideration and togetherness that supposedly will bind a family together, once those bonds have been severed, there is nothing that offers any restraint or constraint. All of the old grudges that had been inhibited while those bonds of family were intact now come to the floor, and great bitterness floods out, and those two warring camps will never come together. In the Garden of Eden it resulted in Cain killing his brother, Abel, if you believe those fairy tales. The Palestinians and the Jews have a common ancestor, and you see how bitter the circumstances, conditions are between those two. A type of bitterness and hostility unmatched anywhere in the world at this particular time. But the anger and the hatred may be duplicated if you consider the British and the Irish. What Jonathan Swift recommended is that the children of poor Irish people be used as food for the British. They can be grown, fattened, and served in various ways on the tables of the very important...
