doctor exercises due care and properly performs an operation or procedure that meets with the standards in the community, that doctor cannot be found to have committed malpractice. The only thing that's being said is that you, doctor, have been trained. The fact that you have been licensed indicates that you successfully completed that training. So not only do you have a theoretical knowledge, but you have demonstrated that you can carry out whatever procedure or operation you are to be faced with in your practice. And the only thing you're required to do is to carry out those actions in a way that meets the standards that you understand in advance, that you know are going to be applied to you. So how then can that person say that he or she is victimized when his or her negligence has severely damaged another person who trusted that doctor, who placed his or her life, literally, in the hands of that doctor? We have Senator Foley bringing bill after bill talking about the unborn. Well, there are some children who come into the world fully born who were damaged while unborn. I have yet to see Senator Foley take on the medical industry--and I don't call it a profession--the medical industry by saying something about damage done to the unborn while they're in the womb, although that's redundant.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: If they're unborn, they're in the womb. But not necessarily. If they die, they will never be born. But I have points that I need to make, and I can make them on this bill. There's an inconsistency on this floor. There's a lack of follow-through on the part of people such as Senator Foley and those who support him on all these bills talking about the unborn. They pick the easy targets. But those who can fight back are never approached by them. And the medical industry can fight back. They could even tell Senator Foley he may have trouble getting reelected. But these other bills don't affect any constituency that is as organized, focused, powerful, and that has such influence with the Legislature. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, you may continue. This will be your third time, as you know.
