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Nebraska's constitution. But there is considerable damage that the state is going to...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...experience, and I don't know if it will ever recover from that damage. This is an ideal time for me to discuss such things, because once again, the bill before us is not hurt by it. But I still may see a need farther down the line to offer some amendments to this bill which I have agreed not to try to modify at this point. But I'm very serious about everything that I've said this morning, about everything that I am saying, everything that I will say. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Hartnett. We're discussing FA1495 to the committee amendments.

SENATOR HARTNETT: Mr. President, members of the body, I'd give my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. And since I have another amendment pending, I will speak this time, and then I will close. But there might be others who would like to speak. And I deeply appreciate those who yielded time to me. Members of the Legislature, I want to do what I can while I'm here to try to set the Legislature as an institution on a sounder footing than it will be if certain things are not done. I want to teach those who are teachable how to fight off an overwhelming majority, when that person believes that what the majority is doing will hurt the public interest. Anybody who has enough principle, enough stamina, and will not be daunted by overwhelming odds, will serve the public in a way that the majority never will. Those who are perpetually in the majority can sit back and take it easy, and don't need to even be concerned about how to wage a lengthy, acrimonious legislative battle, because they always have things their way. Those who don't have things their way, but nevertheless believe that things should go differently from the way that the majority is
