necessity of it. I do not think my colleagues yet are aware of the seriousness, the precariousness of our circumstances in this Legislature. I think there are people outside the body who are starting to become aware, because they have clients who hired them to get certain things done, and those things are not being done, and they may not be done at all. I had said that I would make some comments about my own interests in my closing, but fortunately I haven't had to reach my closing yet. I have a priority bill in the Judiciary Committee. Senator Brashear and I work on these kind of bills. It relates to a refinement of the DNA law. When we work on these kind of bills, we produce amendments that will allow the bill to advance to the floor of the Legislature and probably be enacted into law. If I have, and I do, a priority bill that means as much to me as that DNA bill does, and it means a great deal to me, but nevertheless, I'm willing to sacrifice my priority bill, you know how I feel about yours, don't you? Mine will go down the drain of a certainty, but so will yours. I will lose my seat in the Legislature of a certainty if nothing is done to overturn the term limits amendment to the constitution, but so will all of you. Nobody who's on this floor now will survive my time in the Legislature. I have made a mistake in my calculations. For some reason, I was of the opinion that when I'm out of here some of the people who are here right now would still have two years, but that's not true. The first half are going to be...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...lopped off after they serve two years into the upcoming term of the Legislature. Then, those of us who are here now, the rest of us, we will be gone in four years. I had been spending time, a little more than I had been in the past, with some senators, hoping that gradually and slowly I could bring them to see certain things, so that when we are gone they would be able to fill right in and do some things that will need doing. But they're not going to be here. Nobody will be here. So we have to try, if we can, to build into the system itself some principles which will take a little time to be destroyed. And maybe by the time they are destroyed, others will realize that they had some value and will try to reinstate them. But we have to do the best we can...
