Senator Bourne has identified that. And let me add some dimensions to that. First of all, if we had done this a number of years ago when we should have...this has been discussed...this basic format and integration of groundwater with surface water and the establishment of devices to integrate the two has been discussed for 15 or 20 years in this Legislature. And the very people who have kept this from happening when it should have happened are now here asking you to spend a great deal of money to fix things up. One of the things that they're going to need money for is buying up rights, Senator Bourne. They're going to need a big bunch of money to buy up rights in the over-appropriated Platte River, and they're going to need money to buy up rights in the over-appropriated Republican River. And those rivers are over-appropriated because we didn't take action sooner. So now the very people that didn't want us to take action want to come to us for General Fund money to pay for buying up the rights that should never have been given out in the first instance. So that's going to be expensive. Secondly, the people who have the water rights want to be sure that any change that occurs is done on the basis of exact science. And there are elaborate procedures and requirements in this bill before every stage of every action that basically requires a great deal of research and study. And that's going to be very expensive also. Thirdly, it sets up an elaborate bureaucratic procedural structure. It has the department doing studies, and then a plan with the NRDs, and then the NRDs plan with one another, and then they have to try to reach agreement, and then there's an inter-agency council that's set up. It's going to be very expensive from a bureaucratic point of view. When you start adding up all these things, to say that this bill costs \$2.5 million is not even coming close to what the ultimate cost is going to be, in my opinion. And I don't think it's fair, given everything that's happened and given the nature of the matter, to require or to ask of the state, especially in this time and place, to pick up all of the costs of this new system. And I think that it would be fairer to have a water fee on every well in this state and on the municipalities, on everybody who uses water, and that ought to be a part of the system, and we ought not to pass this bill until it is a part of the system. I used to think that certain things could come first, and we would adjust the fee system
