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later. But I learned from the livestock management experience that that's not what happens. You get what you want, and then you forget about paying for it, and you fight off paying for it as long as you can. Well I hope there are enough people in this Legislature that want to see...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...this paid for by the people who are primarily benefiting from the system, that this bill does not go forward until some compromises have been made on the financing. Because frankly, we don't have the money to do this, and we are really going to stretch to have the money to do it, even to do it in part, and there is no good reason why this all should come out of general funds. The next time I get a chance to speak, I'm going to start on page 82, at the bottom, which I think is the very beginning point of understanding how all this works. And I'm going to start there and go back and forth with Senator Schrock, so that I can know that I have an understanding of this bill. And I think it would behoove all of you, because you're going to get lots of questions from your constituents, to be able to explain the basic sequence of events that can and will, and will, take place shortly in this state,...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...that will be mind-boggling to your constituents, if they're rural people in the Platte Valley and the Republican Valley especially.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I would like to ask Senator Schrock a question or two about the task force that brought this bill to us.
