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hearings. Does that seem unreasonable on my part?

SENATOR SCHROCK: We held some of the hearings based upon where the large consumption of water takes place, and where the water problems are being faced. If you saw that map this morning of the state of Nebraska, you can see...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...you can see the area of the state where most of the problems are from Grand Island west.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But Senator Schrock, if we're looking at the state as a whole, can one part of the state experience a problem so serious that we would come in with comprehensive legislation like this and it not have an impact on other parts of the state, such as the most densely populated part?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I think this bill impacts certain parts of the state a lot more than it does the other part. And I'd say the impacted areas are the ones on that map.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And the decisions...

SENATOR SCHROCK: But it does impact the whole state, I would agree with you.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are there any people...were there people on the task force from Omaha?

SENATOR SCHROCK: There was two.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if it is felt that the entire state is involved, and there was no hearing in the city of Omaha, could somebody from Omaha feel that Omaha was slighted, or it was felt...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...that those who are experiencing the problems are the only ones who should have something to say
