And the NRD is going to have some tough choices down there if we don't have some different moisture situation in this state here pretty soon, and there's going to be some curtailing of water, especially in the Lower, Middle Republican NRD. That will take place. And...but I don't think anybody is going to be paid to use less water. Matter of fact, I would almost assure you of that.

SENATOR BEUTLER: You think nobody is...I'm sorry, you think nobody is...

SENATOR SCHROCK: I don't think anybody is going...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...going to be paid?

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...to pay anybody any...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK: ...to use less water. It's just going to be a fact of life.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Senator, I think I'll stop there for this time, and go to a different matter next time. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Stuhr, on the Chambers amendment to FA1502.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I don't see any problem with Senator Chambers' amendment. But what I really wanted to speak on is talking a little bit about the importance of water, and that is the importance of water not only to agriculture, but to our entire state. I believe it is essential, as I said, not only to agriculture, but also to the environment, to industry, for human health, and for the overall economic viability of the state. And I think there was some mention of the makeup of the task force. There were 20 members that were irrigators on the task force, but that left 29 members with other involvement, including municipalities, the power districts, environment. As we mentioned before, there were some members at large. There were members from recreation,
