SENATOR SCHROCK: It's a good idea to explore it, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Your time is up, Senator...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: ...Schrock. Sorry. Your time is up. Seeing no further lights on, Senator Chambers, you're recognized to close on your amendment, FA1518.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President and members of the Legislature, if we could just surmount that money issue, I believe there are parts of the bill that would have to be discussed, especially...oh, I don't see Senator Erdman, but he told me what his bill will do, and Senator Schrock did not explain this when he was talking about the bill. It's going to build a moat around the 11th Legislative District and cede it Iowa. I didn't know that. So when we get to Senator Erdman's bill that he said is a part of this amendment, I'm going to have to look at that, and I may not be persuaded to accept it, but maybe I will. There could be benefits, when I think about it--our own school district, our own government. There are possibilities here. And I believe what could be demonstrated is how effectively and fairly a benevolent dictator can be. By the way, the term "tyrant" has not always been tarnished. Some of these terms were just a descriptive word to designate an individual in a position of leadership, directorship, or power. They come to take on negative meanings probably because of the individuals who fill those positions and the way they conducted themselves. But being a dictator is not necessarily bad. That can be a neutral term. "Tyrant" can be a neutral term. But if you're going to take the notion and understanding that people have of it, then those are not good terms. And that brings me back to what I was suggesting, not really suggesting, but wanting to explore--why the Governor, or the Governor's Office would not be the one to resolve these issues. Since we have a situation where the constitution creates a Board of Pardons, the Governor is a member of that board, the Attorney General is a
