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potential ground water conditions, including subirrigation conditions, require the designation of areas with special regulation of developmental (sic) use. Despite the fact that I see a bit of awkwardness in places, do you feel this intent language is necessary since it's relating specifically to conservation of ground water? And this is existing language, by the way.

SENATOR SCHROCK:     It looks to me like it's more just flowery words than it really...than really anything of substance, Senator Chamber (sic).

SENATOR CHAMBERS:    So here's what I'm asking, and not to get you to agree to do it. If language like this, since we have kind of a detailed statement of intent generally about water, if this were eliminated, it would not really...let me not phrase it as a leading question. Would the elimination of this language hurt the actual provisions of the law, as it would be if we enacted this bill?

SENATOR SCHROCK:    Well, just from what I see on the surface, it would not...

SENATOR CUDABACK:   One minute.

SENATOR SCHROCK:    ...change anything...intent of the bill.

SENATOR CHAMBERS:   And I don't have an amendment to do that yet, but I just want to call your attention to it. Because the approach I intend to take is to offer these types of corrective amendments that I have, then allow the...this provision of this division to be adopted, then move to the next division, and through all of them, and let them be adopted, before I offer any substantive amendments. Then we will have the entire bill before us and not my piecemealing perhaps by offering an amendment to a division when it might somehow impact on a later division that's not before us. So that's the way I'm going to proceed, just to let you know that my agreeing, once I've offered these types of corrective amendments, as I call them, to...if I do agree with it. Let me say it a different way. I would not stand in the way...
