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Task Force report, which is the report that they put out and the recommendations they put out, and I went directly back, because I'm very interested in the financing side of it, to see what they recommended as far as financing is concerned and to see if this bill comports to the report with respect to the recommended financing. And the first suggestion they made with regard to financing was that the financing be split up, to a certain extent, between the state and the NRDs. And with respect to the state financing, they advocated the creation of a Water Resource Trust Fund, and they recommended that this Legislature levy an additional sales tax sufficient in amount to create a fund of \$11.1 million annually, and that that \$11.1 million would be used to support the implementation of the integrated surface ground water management plans, as well as what they describe as a wider spectrum of interrelated water management activities, water funds, and other water management activities, including \$6.3 million that would go into the Resources Development Fund and the Soil and Water Conservation Fund and the Small Watersheds Flood Control Fund, all of which are receiving money currently. So there would be some freeing up of funds, but there would be an additional sales tax, enough to generate \$11 million in total funding. And then they would recommend about 40 percent of that fund be placed in certain interrelated water management needs. Then they would further recommend that the NRD ground water management activities be exempted from the budget lid, and the NRDs would also be allowed to supplement their 4.5 percent property tax levy with an additional levy, and that levy would be imposed only in ground water management areas. And then they recommended, further, that the NRDs go after further funding as in the Environmental Trust and with the federal government. When the funds are broken down, it's a little hard to tell how much of this will be new spending and how much of it will be old spending. And there are some discrepancies in here about how much total funding is needed for particular items. But it appears that nearly \$5 million in this account will be for research and for data and for planning and implementation of the different processes that are described in this bill, and then they have \$3.5 million that goes to what they call tools in overappropriated basins:...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.
