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length. Now they're totally dependent upon the NRD. And I would be content to have them be dependent in that situation if the NRD they were dealing with was constructed along the lines of one person, one vote. Would you have any objection to saying that based on scientific information the city ought to be allowed to declare its own protective area around a well field unless the NRD that they're in is a one person, one vote NRD? Would you be amenable to that amendment?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schrock, would you yield?

SENATOR SCHROCK: (Microphone malfunction)...think about that, Senator Beutler. Why don't, between now and 1:00, let's pull up a study and see what the NRD situation is for one person, one vote. You're talking about the NRD out at the Sidney area. That is pretty much one person, one vote.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Well, I recognize that even if it's one person, one vote, there may be areas of the state where it would be dominated by the town people, or there are other areas where it would be dominated by the nontown people. But I'm willing to go with that if at least the town people are fairly represented on the NRD board.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Let's take a look between now and 1:00 at what the NRD situation is as far as representation, Senator Beutler. Let's do that. I don't want to interject that into here, because that just causes problems. Take a look at it next year. Again, we did narrow that down, once upon a time. And you know, it's kind of interesting, I had an NRD that adamantly opposed the one person, one vote. I looked at their structure, and they were one person, one vote and they didn't even know it. (Laugh) So sometimes things get almost humorous. I'll take a look at it with you. I'd hate to interject that into this bill. If you think there's a reasonable reason they might need more protection, I could certainly work with you on that also.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Thank you, Senator Schrock. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.
