to what is being said. And I do believe that the heavy issues are being addressed, are being discussed. But exactly how they will be resolved is a difficult matter. There are some that I have, as far as the bill is concerned. But it's not necessary for me to talk about those that are being adequately discussed by others. For my part, I haven't been able to draft amendments yet because I'm not sure enough that an amendment I would draft and offer would adequately address what it is that I'm concerned about. So even though I'm drafting these types of amendments that are being readily adopted--and I'm pleased with that--there are other things that are on my mind. And I want to remind Senator Schrock once again that before I will offer any substantive amendment I will wait until all of the divisions, if they're to be adopted, will be adopted, and then we will have before us the bill, and I won't have to figure which particular division of the bill...of the committee amendment I'm offering an amendment to. What I have done, so that I can try to keep straight what I'm presenting in the course that I'm pursuing, the pages that embrace each division. So I'm trying to draft my amendments to the division that is before us. You'll notice that I haven't had much to say this morning on the bill itself. But that doesn't mean I'm not listening, that I'm not thinking. And I had talked to Senator Schrock yesterday, and maybe the day before, about some of the concerns that I have. So I don't think it's necessary for me to continue raising those identical concerns. But I do have to take this opportunity, since I'm not taking a long time on the amendments themselves that I offer, to come back to the money. And I want to amend what Senator Redfield offered. It shows I'm listening to her. She said the two most important things in Nebraska are people and water, neither of which the state has enough of, I think. I want to add a third one. The three most important things in Nebraska are people, water, and money, none of which Nebraska has enough of. Such being the case, we have to seriously contend with this idea of \$4 million. I have told you all--whether anybody listened or not, it's in the record--that I want to shield the court from taking any cuts. I don't want the Supreme Court to take any cuts. I want them to get some money. How can I vote to raise taxes for one item and then say, but don't touch this that I want to protect from cuts? If I could get \$4 million by way of taxation, or any other way, and give it to the court, you
