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like me from your districts. They don't hear me standing up here saying debase and degrade the constitution. They see me trying to defend and protect it. They look around and see the ones they sent here, the ones they sent, the superior people, the master race, the ones who know how to write constitutions. You know something funny? People who are considered by white people uncivilized didn't have to write everything in a constitution, because those groups didn't have to have this kind of stuff written down to make them treat people and each other...

SENATOR VRTISKA: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the way they needed to be treated. They didn't even have padlocks, didn't even know what a lock was, didn't even know what it means to say, I own this land to the exclusion of everybody else making use of it. This is mother earth. We're mother earth's children, and the children have access to everything the mother produces, based on what they need. Didn't build fences, keep people out and keep my children in. But anything those who have the kill power declare to be a certain thing, it becomes that, because they can force people to say it's that whether they believe it or not. So go ahead, demean your constitution, debase your constitution. I think this whole discussion is beneath me, and I'm going to try my best not to say another word on it. This is white people's mess. I'm going to let white people do with it what they will. Thank you, Mr. President. And in order that I don't give anybody a chance to respond, I won't pull that motion just yet.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Stuthman.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I would like to enter into a little bit of a dialog with Senator Landis.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator Landis, will you yield?

SENATOR LANDIS: Sure.
