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concerned. We haven't been celebrating much of anything, Senator Beutler. Celebration requires joy and enthusiasm and optimism and planning and execution. It's seldom just spontaneous, at least of any duration. What's wrong...this is General File, we're in charge of this legislative body. This bill may need improvement.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Maybe we're going to go away, but maybe nostalgia is all that's left, but that's a part of the mourning process. The people insist that we involve them. When we don't involve them, we end up with term limits, in all our wisdom. What's wrong with involving them in a vote? What's wrong with moving this through three stages of debate? What's wrong with engaging in the time-honored tradition of give and take and amend...and the amendatory process that improves this legislation, so we send out to the people an opportunity to vote on their State Fair? This is about rural and urban and I, for one, or as a one urban senator who has lots of very small rural roots is hunting for an opportunity to talk about One Nebraska. We own that land. This is part of the huge restructuring...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR BRASHEAR: ...this whole state needs to do. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Brashear. Senator Cudaback.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Mr. Speaker, members, I guess I'm a very biased person. As many of you know, I'm very opinionated. Senator Schrock says you never know somebody till you live with them, and we do share...we share an apartment together. I'd better clarify that. But, anyway, I'm not going to talk a whole lot this time on this issue. Personally, I said I'm biased and I think it's the only fair issue out there myself. But with that, I will turn my time over to Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Senator Chambers, you have 4 minutes and 20 seconds.
