SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Thank you, Jim "Will Rogers" Cudaback. Members of the Legislature, I listened closely to what Senator Brashear said, as I always do when he speaks. But I do not always agree with him, and I certainly do not always vote with him. But he discussed some matters that I think are appropriate for us to consider while looking at this relic, this dead thing that ought to be buried. Senator Brashear, one thing that I know for a fact facilitates mourning is to have a clean severing of that bond between the individual who remains and the one who has departed. You sold the farm. This State Fair may be all of the things that Senator Brashear suggested. It may be all of the things that Senator Cudaback suggested. It may be all of the things that Senator Beutler suggested. But if you can get something which is so great for free, why do you want to pay millions for it? Senator Louden has an amendment, which I hope people will have the opportunity to discuss, which offers to have Mitchell take over the fair. Senator Aguilar, in an area that is close... I don't know where Mitchell is. My geography of Nebraska is worse than it is with reference to the rest of the world. But I believe that Grand Island may be more centrally located than Mitchell, and I'm sure it's larger. If Grand Island is offered to take over the fair, why is there the insistence that it stay in Lincoln? They don't bring a lot of the critters who are going to be judged at the fair from Lincoln. If you ask a child what is the number one thing that you think about that you might enjoy living in Lincoln, I'm sure that child would not say...
