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SENATOR D. PEDERSON: I...thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Pederson. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, nobody who has spoken in favor of this proposal has addressed what Senator Aguilar offered on behalf of Grand Island, or Senator Loudon with reference to Mitchell. What it seems to be boiling down to is that this might be a source of income for Lincoln. When I turn on television during the fair season, and I don't know when that is, so don't hold me to that knowledge, you know what I hear being discussed more than anything else? That the State Patrol is going to be monitoring all these games that are brought there, the people who are running these games because they are drawn like flies, I am not going to say to manure because that is not a sweet-sounding or smelling term, drawn like flies to honey. And the State Patrol has to be there because there are cheats, scammers, people who might endanger the welfare of little children and others, and that's what is in the mind of a lot of people who think about the State Fair. I'd like to ask Senator Beutler a question, if he is...I don't see him. I will ask Senator Landis a question. He's from Lincoln.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Landis, would you yield please.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Landis, when was the last time you dropped in on the State Fair?

SENATOR LANDIS: Two years ago.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Did the State Fair operate last year?

SENATOR LANDIS: It did.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Why did you not go last year, if it's not delving into your personal affairs?

SENATOR LANDIS: I have a small real estate operation. It takes...that is a high season for me to do my job. So I was doing my job.
