Fair Board, that we couldn't make changes. We couldn't make changes to look to the future what the fair should be for the people who come there. Now personally, I never rode with a drunk to get to the fair and came 700 miles, as Senator Cudaback did. But I...if Senator Chambers would ask me, I've been attending the State Fair for the last 40-plus years, regularly. Why do I go there? Well I go there because hopefully I'll see something new. Unfortunately, in the last few years you haven't seen anything new. But I think with the dynamics we have in the management that's taking over the fair, and with the board members who now are...have come to the conclusion that some things have to be changed, the fair can be like Iowa, it can become a valuable part of this state. And the heritage is there. The agriculture background that this state is based on is there. And we have a right to be...we have a right for it to be one of the premier parts of this state. And the only way we can do that at this point is to provide some kind of funding to move it off of dead center. I have a feeling--and I could be wrong, and I've been wrong before--but common sense tells me there's a real good possibility that once we get the infrastructure developed to where it's going to be an attractive place in Nebraska, that people will come to it. If I didn't think that, I certainly wouldn't be supporting this. But I do support what this body should do, and that's to move this thing forward, provide some funding to enhance the grounds, enhance the buildings, enhance...we have the people that are going...I'm sure are going to enhance the kind of entertainment, the kind of affairs that are carried on at the fair that are valuable to the people of this state. So I stand as a strong supporter to do that, because I have faith that it can happen. I have faith because I...as we were talking about this, most of you know of business that have had struggle and struggle, and either failed and went out of business and somebody came along and picked it up and it became successful. Why? Because management took care. We have now--and I don't mean to be negative to any of the members of the Fair Board over the years, because I know they had good intent. The problem was, they didn't have the vision, in my opinion, didn't have the vision to make the things happen that would keep the fair viable and bring the people to the fair. And like I said, I think now with the kind of leadership we're experiencing at the State Fair, that can
