But I think it's the wrong choice, simply because I think there's a lesson to be learned here that's already been demonstrated, that in fact if the kind of programs are presented at the fair, the attractions are made available so that people will be encouraged to go, we'll see a different dynamics develop at the fairgrounds of the state of Nebraska. So I think, again, even though people may disagree--and certainly we all have a right to our opinions--but I can see a vision...I have the vision, and I've had it for a long time, that things could change at the State Fair in Lincoln, Nebraska to make it one of the premier institutions of this state. And anybody that wants to share that view, all they need to do is talk to some of the people who are now engaged in trying to resolve the problems...

SENATOR ENGEL PRESIDING
