that is really not it. It is just that there...to change the amount, to change the dollar that goes into the State Fair to try to keep it going for some time. I think realistically, the city of Lincoln, you know, it's a very good economic impact to them. It brings a lot of money into the city of Lincoln. You know, not just the fair part of it; it's the people that come to Lincoln, that stay a week, the exhibitors that are participating in the fair, and not only in the agricultural portion of it. I think the underlying thing is, do we want to, you know, let something die--hopefully it won't--but let it die, and eliminate our youth from a state competition in their 4-H and FFA programs, their livestock competitions, their sewing competitions, their baking competitions, their craft competitions? Those are key items. It goes a lot further than just the youth coming to the fair. A lot of the 4-H programs, which I am very much in favor of, I was...did not have the ability...was not...4-H was not available when I was young in my area, and I did not go into a 4-H program. But all of my kids have been in 4-H program. My grandchildren are in 4-H program. But this is very important. It gets a family to work together with a project, helping the youth. I think that is the underlying thing that I am really concerned about. I served on the task force of the child death review team. If a lot of those parents could have been involved in 4-H, could have been involved with a family that had some 4-H, had some projects, had something that they could do, that is what kids want to do. Kids want to do things when they're young. They want to do things when they're 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12 years old. That's when they want to do things. And the thing that they want to do is they want to win on the local area,...

SENATOR ENGEL: One minute.

SENATOR STUTHMAN: ...they want to go to the State Fair for the competition. It's just like sports, the competition. It brings a lot of people together. They really want to compete. And that's what makes people. And I think this is a thing that we've got to keep on our forefront. Do we want to eliminate a state competition place for our youth? Or do we want to try to help it out, keep it going? I think the direction that the State Fair is going right now is very favorable. But I think
