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this is something that we have to try to keep. So those are my comments. Thank you.

SENATOR ENGEL: Thank you, Senator Stuthman. Senator Cudaback. Senator Cudaback waives. Next, Senator Bromm. Senator Fromm waives. Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Mr. Speaker, I'd just ask if there is a colleague of mine who's an anti who wants...I mean against the bill, who wants a bit of time. I would yield my time, rather than take it, to somebody who hadn't gotten a chance to speak against the State Fair, because I would yield my time to that person.

SENATOR ENGEL: Is there anyone who would accept this offer?

SENATOR LANDIS: In that case, I'll waive my time.

SENATOR ENGEL: Seeing none, thank you, Senator Landis. Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I rise in support, obviously, of Senator Louden's amendment. I believe that it draws some attention to some obvious facts that need to be examined. And you all have a diagram of the Scotts Bluff County fairgrounds. And certainly, if the body can't live with this, I think that we need to look...you know, look outside the box, so to speak, as Senator Louden pointed out in his introductory remarks, and really look at how changes can be made. You know, does something need to happen every year? Should we invest some resources every other year to make it better, leave people wanting more instead of wanting less, because they're pummeled every year? But certainly we need to think outside the box. And I go back to my reservation, ultimately, of putting some of this language into the constitution. But I certainly do rise in support of Senator Louden's amendment, and I would yield the balance of my time to Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ENGEL: Senator Erdman.
