SENATOR LANDIS: Among other things, there is the desire to have more free entertainment at the fair, so that people can go and get a richer return for their investment. There is a desire to have interactive exhibits. There is the hope of having more premiums to entice a larger number of demonstrators and people who bring things to show. And that, particularly when they're kids, produces their families coming as well, and that also extends the amount of attendance.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And they've convinced you that these things are going to reverse the lack of attendance, and the State Fair is going to take wings and fly?

SENATOR ENGEL: One minute.

SENATOR LANDIS: (Laugh) It is my hope that the State Fair takes wings and flies.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I can't ask you for more. Thank you, Senator Landis. Members of the Legislature, we see that this is a waste of money to do what we're doing, even if you didn't have objections to putting something like this in the constitution. But my major, ongoing objection is that it ought not to be in the constitution. If it were attempted legislatively, my whole argument would be different.
