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all in developing this amendment, I've talked with Senator Baker towards...that we need to work towards that end of stopping these individuals from building these stills on wheels and then later expanding their plant and qualifying for additional credits. As the story has evolved and we figure out, or I figure out who exactly is involved in this industry, let me tell you kind of where I'm at now. Under LB 536 there's four plants that are either built now and producing ethanol or will be producing ethanol by June 30 of this year. There are supposedly a number of other plants that are trying to qualify for LB 536 credits by the portable still concept. I've talked to people who are involved in the lending of money to these plants. They're convinced that there will be no more than these four plants that are built here. And let me tell you about these four plants, how they're built. There's a company that's largely based in Minnesota, who has an office here in Columbus, and this gentleman came down with a couple people and visited with some members of the Revenue Committee and kind of explained how his company works. And I'm going to kind of make a long story out of this, but basically what he does is he does...he's a design-builder, and goes to the groups that want to build these plants and he says, I'll just take care of pretty much everything for you. I'll do the financing, I'll get the ground for you, I'll design it, my guys will build it, I'll help you run it, I'll train people to manage it, and he's kind of a one-stop service, and he takes over, pretty much, you know, with permission, of course, of the group of farmers that got together that want to build one of these, and he just takes care of it. The problem with that is, is that he's what's called a design-builder. And he's doing nothing improper, nothing wrong, nothing illegal. He's simply very, very clever. He's a good businessman. But what he does is he designs the plant and then he has a construction company as well that builds 75 to 80 percent of these plants. And in conversations with him, I asked him, I said, well how much of these plants are actually bid out to other subcontractors? Well, 20 to 25 percent. And I said, do you advertise for bids so Nebraska people can work on them? And he says, no, generally these people find us. So then he did give us a list of...he does have Nebraskans that work for him directly, and he gave us a list of subcontractors who did work on the plants and that are Nebraska-based. So I mean, he
