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important. I think it's very important that we do use Nebraska labor as much as we possibly can. And I support Senator Bourne's bill...or I think it's in the bills to follow, on the new incentives, that they has to be put out to bid to all Nebraska companies. The facility at Central City is being built, and it's used a lot of Nebraska product...or a lot of Nebraska labor. They do have a lot of their own labor that's stationed in Columbus, Nebraska, that follows them, that they maybe not put up for bids, because it's their own company and their own labor doing that. They did use a lot of local labor for the dirt work, and for some of the building of the tanks. They even offered some...the same company, another contract. But when they only started on July 15, they were really under the gun to get this plant completed on June 30. That company even turned down that offer to...the contract that they offered to them to do some more of the plant, because they said they did not want to hold up the plant, they did not feel like they had the capability of finishing it by that date. So they even turned it down. So some of the labor was offered to Nebraskans, and maybe was not Nebraskans used in that labor, and maybe it was, I'm not sure. But I know that there was some offered to other plants. And they made a real effort to use Nebraska companies, Nebraska contractors,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR KREMER: ...Nebraska labor, every time that they could. So I think, again, that we're trying to do the right thing here, trying to still give incentives to plants out there that want to expand. I do have a little concern with maybe what Senator Bourne mentioned, that we maybe need to look into. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Kremer. Senator Bourne. This will be your third time, Senator.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. And again, what we're trying to establish is, is this the right policy, that if there's an ethanol plant that's, say, producing...let me start over here, because it is confusing. And I'm talking to George Kilpatrick, the legal counsel, and talking to Senator
