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pieces--innovation and scholarships.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. But if we were going to make the broad categories, it would be education, environment, and compulsive gambling. Thank you. I just wanted that in the record and I wanted it to be clear that I'm not making that up. Members of the Legislature, what will this constitutional proposal do for sure if you adopt it? The only thing it will do for sure is to take money from environment and education. That's all it will do for sure. It's going to reduce that amount of money. That money which constitutes the reduction will go to the State Fair Board. The only purpose of this bill is to funnel money into the State Fair Board, this constitutional amendment proposal, and it's being complicated so that attention will be diverted from the only thing that it really does. None of this other language is necessary. It is excess verbiage and it means nothing. It does not change anything. The Legislature right now can do what it wills with that lottery money. If you go along with Senator Landis and the Lincoln senators, who are looking out for Lincoln, by the way...that's what this is about for them, they are looking out for Lincoln...if you go along with him, the only thing you're doing is reducing that money to education and environment, and you're putting verbiage in the constitution which absolutely is not necessary. It does not achieve anything, because the Legislature has the same power over that money which it has now, except that which is given to the State Fair Board. Because I'm not sure of where things are with this amendment, I'd like to ask Senator Landis a question.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Landis, would you yield again, please?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Landis, with the amendments being considered,...

SENATOR LANDIS: Uh-huh.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...when it comes to the amount to the State Fair Board, they will go away from a percentage and go to a flat dollar amount. Is that correct, \$2 million?
