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line, here a little, there a little, everywhere a little, little, and then when they try to act on it they don't get it right. The key is that you are not ensuring in the constitution what it is you want to protect. All we have to do, since we created the Nebraska Environmental Endowment Fund legislatively, is to abolish it. Anything that is created by the Legislature can be abolished by the Legislature. Simply stating or referring to something in the constitution without creating it there does not ensure its ongoing existence. But anyway, that's not my amendment, that's somebody else's, and the education people aren't very worried. I'd like to ask "Deacon" Jones a question, if he's here.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then, Senator Jones, you're going to go along with this scheme, that you acknowledge is unfair and that it's unfair to your area, but you're going to go along with it. Is that true?
