SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

If this proposal, that is LR 209CA, is presented to the public and they vote yes, all that's guaranteed is a sucking out of a certain percentage from the money that would be available for education and the environment. That's the only thing that is guaranteed. Why don't they just strip it down to that and let it be clear?
