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I always tend to get really high-level with this, but it's all I have to deal with. Senator Mossey makes fun of me at times because I talk about how many doors I knocked on, and that was two years ago. One of the things that was communicated to me, very effectively, one of the things I communicated was a lot of the folks in my district and a lot of the people that I was talking to understand more about a lot of these issues than I do. They always will. There's...a guy that worked for DTN, down the street from me, he understands ag issues probably better than I ever will. Those type...that type of information from people like that is valuable. They also communicated to me the idea that, hey, you are there doing our work down there, you are our representative. These aren't the unwashed masses, folks. They want us to let them vote on this issue. It's not that difficult. Now, do they have the right to do it? That's the difficult part. We've done it over and over again. We've allowed the people the right to vote on issues like this. It's frustrating, because we act like it's not there. I mentioned last year, open up the Warner Chamber if you don't like it. Open it up, and let's go elect a house of representatives. Let's do it tomorrow. Let's get that resolution driven. Because to tell you the truth, they are the second legislative body. We have to acknowledge that. And whether they're petitioning it or whether they want it from us when we're walking around trying to figure it out, it's got to be done. This is something that needs to happen. From a moral aspect, I don't even know if I can speak to it that much. The fact of the matter is, when I was in college, I knew guys that were losing two, three grand at the track. Who was helping them back then? We got more help now for people going to the riverboats that aren't even in our state than we had for the folks that were losing money at the track. I've mentioned to Senator Maxwell: hypocrites unite. We might as well have it stamped on our forehead. The lottery: I was in a convenience store the other day, and a guy is buying \$60 worth of lottery tickets. You think his kid could have used that money? Somebody help me out with this. Where are we going? And we're worried about opening up a casino? I mentioned this morning, there's no gross domestic product. You know what? I haven't once made the argument this is going to be economically sound. But it's frustrating to me. We've been debating this for the two years
