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renewable every two years, and so we, again, think, and I think according to the fiscal note, that the fees will take care of the requirements to regulate this industry.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, so it's 100 percent fee-based.

SENATOR STUHR: Yes. Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. And do you think it's appropriate that those who are being regulated should pay for the regulation through fees?

SENATOR STUHR: Well, since this...since this is a new industry, I do feel that way, but I think probably they will pass those fees on to their customers.

SENATOR BEUTLER: I see, Senator. Okay. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Beutler and Senator Stuhr. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you. Thank you, Mr. President, members. I kind of want to go through exactly what this bill does now. As you recall, we had extensive debate on General File and, in the minds of some members, it went too far, and now I think that it's, while there might be still a little bit of debate, I do believe that it's an appropriate regulation in this area that I think many of us in here feel needs to be regulated. Now...and the troubles that I had with the bill have been addressed, I believe. In order to become a licensed body artist, the individual has to do several things. Has to have complied with the applicable provision of the Nebraska Cosmetology Act; they have to be 18 years of age to apply tattoos; they have to have a high school diploma or an equivalent education; and then they have submitted evidence of completion of educating (sic), training, or experience satisfactory to the department to ensure protection of the public. This language is slightly different than the rough copy that I had looked at before, and I'm going to ask Senator Stuhr a couple questions because I want to establish a record that...as I don't want overregulation as it relates to education or training, and this again, as I'm
