SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then if Senator Bourne wants me to do some scratching of artwork on his face, I can do it, can't I, without being a practitioner, without being licensed or regulated. Is that true? And I don't mind if you talk to your staff member, because she may have a response to that. What I want now is a response. I'm not trying to use trickery.

SENATOR STUHR: Well, Senator Chambers, you would need a license to do that.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And if I don't have a license and do it, so what? They tell me you're a bad fellow.

SENATOR STUHR: Well, we are...we are...I imagine that your license would be revoked and your facility...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I don't have a...I don't have a license in the first place. I'd just go over there. I say, Senator Bourne, I've got a key and I'm going to burn it red hot, and because you wanted me to make this identifying mark on your forehead, I'm going to do it now. When you leave here this afternoon you shall have the mark of the least, not the beast, of the least. And he says okay, and I do it. And if this bill were the law, what...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...can be done to me or what will be done to me or anybody else?

SENATOR STUHR: Well, Senator Chambers, I think it would be like a hairdresser or a barber. You know, you cannot perform those duties without a license.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But if I do...

SENATOR STUHR: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...what are they going to do to me? If I cut somebody's hair in my house and I'm not a barber, what are they going to do, burn my house down?
