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shown, but this does not require that it relate to what is contained in subdivision (e), because it joins all of these items with the word "and" in line 10, so all of these things must be done. And since they're listed separately, they are different.

SENATOR BOURNE: Exactly. And then...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Bourne. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion of the Chambers amendment to the Stuhr amendment, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, Senator Stuhr just handed me a proposed change which would strike a considerable amount of material from page 13, but I haven't had a chance to really look at it, but it would strike lines 8 through 20. And I...we might be moving in the right direction with what she's offering, but not having had the opportunity to look at it, I can't say for sure that this would do it. Because I do not want to put pressure on Senator Stuhr so that an amendment is hastily drafted that also does not include what we think should be there. But she is looking at lines 8 through 20, which is what Senator Bourne and I have been discussing, and I would like to have the opportunity to further examine it before I say that it is the solution. But by striking everything in lines 8 through 20, and line 8 starts with, "Has submitted evidence of completion," and so forth, then we get down into subdivision (e), those two subsections would be stricken and, in place, there would be the language, "Has submitted evidence of education, training, or experience prescribed or approved by the board to ensure the protection of the public in performing the practices of body art for which the applicant is seeking licensure." That is a tremendous improvement already, because it is connecting the training and experience with what it is you want to do and what you are applying to the state to get permission to do. Then subsection (e), "Has successfully completed an examination prescribed or approved by the board to test the applicant's knowledge of safety, sanitation, and sterilization techniques," that language does not bother me because, again, the examination is going to focus on what that person needs to know how to do
