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about hepatitis C, which there's, I guess, numerous grades of hepatitis. But the hepatitis C, I guess, is the worst and there's only been one documented case of that, of that being transmitted. So, Senator Stuhr, I'll return my time back to you and I'll wait for the amendment. Actually, I see it on the gadget now. I'm going to take a quick read on it, but I think it is what we agreed to.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Stuhr, you still have five minutes, Senator Stuhr, on your opening.

SENATOR STUHR: Okay. Thank you, Senator Bourne. And, Senator Chambers, have you had an opportunity to review the amendment and do you have any comments that you would like to share?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: The only thing that I would say is that if I have any difficulties with it, I will make that determination later, because right now it seems to be acceptable and that's about all I need to say, I think. I am going to support it, in other words.

SENATOR STUHR: All right. Thank you, Senator Chambers. With that, I'll turn the time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. You've heard the opening on FA1553 offered by Senator Stuhr to AM2963. Open for discussion on that amendment. Senator Bourne.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I have the amendment here and Senator Stuhr, as she said, it strikes the existing lines 18 and...8 through 20 on page 13, so now an individual would have "submitted evidence of training or experience prescribed or approved by the board to ensure the protection of the public in performing the practices of body art for which the applicant is seeking licensure." So again, it's strictly limited to training and experience necessary to ensure protection of the public. Then has successfully completed an examination prescribed or approved by the board to test the applicant's knowledge of safety, sanitation, sterilization
