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pharmacies right now, I don't know that you'd talk to anybody. I think there's a method in place where you call...you can call in your prescriptions, and just tell the numbers over the phone, just into a recorder.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Then what do we need the intern involved for?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: Well, not all pharmacies are set up like that, but right now the reason I would tell you is we do have a lack of pharmacists throughout outstate Nebraska would be one major issue. And this...and interns are not to do any...pardon me, are we reading the right thing? It's not interns, by the way, it's...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: ...pharmacy technicians.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Technicians.

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: We are talking about technicians, not interns.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So then what's a technician, somebody who knows the difference between a spark plug and a distributor cap?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I don't think they'd probably know those two definitions.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So what is a technician?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: They would be someone that just has a certain level of education but they are not a pharmacist and they help in the pharmacy.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: It could be somebody that the pharmacist hired off the street, though, couldn't it?

SENATOR CUNNINGHAM: I'm not certain about that, Senator. I'd have to find out the educational requirements of a technician.
