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campaign season. If he calls it before the primary, it's got to be before May. Isn't that when they have primaries, in May? Well, maybe my colleagues can't get retooled in time to come back and do that after being subjected to the Chambers methodology for 60 legislative days so they need a time for recovery. So that means after the primary. But people are going to have to retool their campaign organizations and their strategies. So he might say, well, I don't want to push it too close to the general election, so it will be after the general election, which then puts it close to the beginning of the session in 2005. And I will be loaded for bear. And anything the Governor brings, any bill that a senator offers which says introduced at the request of the Governor or by request of the Governor is one that I will target. And if there is a special session to ensure that the state can kill, kill, kill in the name of all the people and in the name of the father, the son, and that other one, then I will come back and seek my revenge in January. And I'm making it crystal clear, yes, I will seek revenge except that I will not be killing a person. I will be trying to kill the career of an unworthy individual. A Governor should not be known by his obsession, his rabid clutching of the death penalty. But I want him and everybody else to know that I am not going to back off on this issue. The state does not have to kill anybody in order to be safe. Nobody on this floor, with the exception of myself, could probably tell the year the last person was executed and certainly could not give that person's name. So what do the senators really care or what does society at large care about somebody being killed? It's a theoretical abstract notion to them. But I have spent hours upon hours with the condemned, and I have watched what happened to them and the prison personnel. There was a man named Robert Williams who was executed. There were guards crying and not from laughter. There were people apologizing. I didn't watch the execution, but I was in that chamber to make sure that there were no cruel things done to this man. And the ones who were strapping him into the chair could not make eye contact with me. And I positioned myself to try to force them to do it, and they refused. When I watched them strap in John Joubert, the man everybody hated and they wouldn't have known him if they saw him, and I was there with him. And my feeling was that if any man needed somebody with him it was a man who was universally
