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to, yes. I don't think there's any more concern...or I don't think there is concern expressed by the home school folks about the way the bill would end with AM2960.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Could you point me to where, in the committee amendment, that provision rests? Is it subsection (1)(b)?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Raikes.

SENATOR RAIKES: Yes. Let me...rather than waiting, let me look for that, and if...

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Okay.

SENATOR RAIKES: ...I can have few minutes, I'll find that for you, Senator.

SENATOR SYNOWIECKI: Well, Senator Raikes, my constituent--and I hope, and I suspect, in judging from your remarks and your opening to the committee amendments, that this is now fixed with the bill. But of particular concern for my constituent, she has a rather talented academically...a daughter that's rather talented academically, and so advanced, to the point that they're hoping that she'll have her nursing degree by the time she's 19 years old. I mean, this won't have...the bill as it's now...if the committee amendments are adopted, Senator, can you assure me that there will not be any unintended consequences for these...this home school population? Some of these kids are quite talented and go on and earn advanced degrees at very early ages. I mean, compelling them to stay in school towards...to the age of 18...you can assure me, though, that would not have unintended consequences for these home school kids, particularly the particularly talented kids that may start college courses at age 16-17 years old, and that sort of set of circumstances?

SENATOR RAIKES: Senator, subsection (3)(b) I think is where you're referring. It says, "Has completed the program of instruction offered by a school which elects pursuant to section 79-1601 not to meet accreditation or approval requirements." So I think that certainly addresses part of your
