SENATOR FOLEY: I'd have to plead ignorance on that, Senator. I don't know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I will ask Senator Schimek. I see her approaching her mike. I thought maybe she...thank you, Senator Foley. Senator Schimek, since your committee deals with all types, and not just all types, but all boards and commissions, are there any boards or commissions or agencies that address other types of handicaps besides the blind and the hard of hearing?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, Senator. My first instinct...or my first reaction was, you were asking about associations, and...I thought you were, anyway. And what came to mind immediately was ARC, the Association of Retarded Children (sic), who lobby for them. But if you're talking about an agency or a commission, I'd have to think about that for a little while. There are, of course...there are agencies that deal with minorities, like the Indian Commission and the Women's Commission and some of those. I'd have to think a little bit harder...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But I mean physically handicapped.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right. I can't think of anything right off the top of my hand. And legal counsel is shaking her head as well.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Now I would go back to Senator Foley.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Foley, I'm not unsympathetic. But could it be a situation where the blind are able to get legislation at the federal and state level because they do have organizations advocating for them, but no other physically handicapped person or group...
